Just a few weeks ago we celebrated Scout Sunday during our 10:00 worship, and it brought back a memory for me. In 2005, while I was a Youth Pastor in Bentonville, Arkansas, I was on the campus of Arkansas University for an event known as Scouting University. More than 400 boy scouts were there to complete requirements toward one of the 20 merit badge classes being offered. The organizers contacted me to lead the sessions with scouts working toward their Communications Merit Badge. The organizers of the event were the members of Alpha Phi Omega, one of the fraternities from the University of Arkansas. This fraternity was built on the principles of scouting and is a national service fraternity. It's the fraternity I was a member of as an undergraduate. So when I went there on a Saturday, I put on my member pin which I hadn't worn in almost 20 years.

As I met members of the fraternity they were surprised to see my pin, the same as theirs. Many asked me about it, and I would answer, "Yep. Psi Upsilon chapter, spring pledge class of 1983." Then time after time, as I spoke to the members, they would extend their hands and we shook hands using the fraternity handshake. I think the last time I shared that handshake with someone was 15 years earlier. These more recent members and I experienced brotherhood in that handshake which meant we had something in common. We had gone through the same pledging process, learned the same things, shared the same traditions. We had dedicated ourselves to the



three purposes of the fraternity – leadership, friendship, and service. We called each other brothers and we had a family bond. It was a special feeling for me.

I feel that same way each time I attend worship on Sunday morning here at First Christian Church. We share the same goals. We worship, fellowship, work, and serve together. Together we share the experiences of ministry. We are united in Christ and we have a bond as a church family. Together we will soon begin our journeys through the season of Lent as we again prepare for the coming Easter. We don't wear membership pins or have a secret handshake, but that feeling of belonging is very real. I hope you feel it too.

Looking Back at Our History

Homecoming Sunday on September 24 will celebrate the 175th anniversary of our congregation. This year we are including an article in each month's newsletter about the history of our church or a connection to the congregation's past.

The following are excerpts from the first edition of the Marshall Christian, 1914: The first page states, "The Marshall Christian, establish 1914, Harvey Baker Smith - Editor, published every Friday at the corner of Morgan and Jefferson Streets, subscription price – 25 cents." Page two: "The Bible School last Sunday reported an attendance of 323 and an offering of \$8.41." "Music hath charms if it is MUSIC. A great service is impossible without good music. Mrs. Smith asks that every voice that can help will please get in the choir. The preacher insists that you help make our music noted. Practice follows prayer meeting every Wednesday night." The publication listed C.E. Benlher as 'our minister in India,' and the church phone number was 296.

If you missed it last fall, SOS Sunday involved a brief all congregation worship in the sanctuary followed by breaking into teams to go out into our community to serve others. After completing our projects, we met back at the church for soup and sandwiches. It was a FANTAS-TIC way to put our Christianity into service in our community. Afterward, those who participated expressed an interest in continuing this mission in the spring. We have chosen April 30th. There is a poster in the hallway to sign up for a team that best fits your skills and interests. Members are asked to check with friends and neighbors, or ANYONE who could benefit from the services these teams offer, and to please let the FCC Office know at 886-3338.

Youth News

WHEW, these last few months have been a wild ride!! The verse above from the book of Joshua 1:9 is one of my favorites that I have posted on my bedroom wall to remind me of each morning and evening. It's been a good reminder these past months as well. The holidays, the election, the weather, the inauguration, hatred, love, friends, family, illness, health, questions, doubts, and many many changes have made for some tenuous and overwhelming opportunities to remind me often of the scripture. Yet amidst all of this, and maybe because of it, I find myself so grateful and blessed to be able to lead and journey alongside the youth.

To be perfectly honest, there are many Wednesday and Sunday mornings that I wake up and think to myself 'Ugh, it's youth group day again...I am NOT ready for these kids!' I believe I felt that same way everyday when I was a mother of two young ones, if history serves me correctly. But life goes on, and the youth arrive, and they fill me – and each other – with such joy and enthusiasm and love, and I find myself sad that our time together flew by too fast.

For these youth – whether they are 5 or 15 – are my Joshua 1:9. They inspire me to be strong and courageous, and they remind me that God is with me, wherever I go.

Youth group is not always glamorous. Sure, we have fun, we laugh, we play games and goof off and act silly. But more often than not, we explore God, discuss Jesus' teachings and life and death, question, doubt, trust, cry, love, pray, and open ourselves up to all of the joys and concerns that life brings. And God is always, always in our midst, providing comfort and strength.

People wonder why I do this job. I often hear "Bless you Kris, I could never do that." Believe me, I need those blessings after a lock-in, after sleeping (or not sleeping) on a cold hard floor, after long weekends, late nights, endless text messages, or subsisting on popcorn and pizza for days on end. But for all those days and weeks and years in between, I'm the one who is blessed beyond measure. These kids - they come without pretenses, walls or all the baggage of adulthood - they come willing and eager to be open, loving and accepting - they come ready to learn and grow. So as it turns out, I'm the one who is led, and taught, by the youth. It is my hand that is held and comforted, it is my heart that is healed.

Souperbowl

The youth had the privilege of participating in the Souperbowl of Caring on February 3-4th, which is a nationwide effort of youth to help to combat hunger and poverty.

The C.R.Y. Festival Cabinet members concluded their quarterly meeting by serving at the Central MO Food Bank in Columbia on Saturday morning. Seven Marshall youth and adults made up the group of 18, who packed and labeled over 20,000lbs. of frozen sausage for distribution.

Members from the three youth groups spent six cold hours outside the Marshall Wal-Mart, collecting food and monetary donations for the Community Food Pantry of Marshall. Youth then collected additional donations during worship services at both First Christian and Covenant Presbyterian Churches on Sunday.

The Jr. high youth delivered the collections to the Food Pantry on Wednesday, Feb. 8th where they were met with much gratitude and excitement!

We received the following note from the Community Food Pantry of Marshall: "Dear members of the First Christian Church youth group,

Your outstanding work in sponsoring the "Souperbowl of Caring" was remarkable! Our congratulations and thanks for the \$575.03 donation and the 524 pounds of food. I would like to tell you what you have accomplished with your gifts. You helped a single parent put food on the family table. You made it possible for a child to eat this weekend. You made a difference in the life of a neighbor. You shared food. You brought hope. You inspired all of us here at the Community Food Pantry with your generosity. May God's blessings be with you always."

On a personal note, I am grateful to be a witness to all of the children and youth, as they continue to follow Jesus with generosity, love and joyful hearts. Thank you to the congregation for your continued support of the youth and myself.
